If someone is at risk for suicide, you can watch for warning signs, including:

- Talking about being a burden
- Self injurious behaviors
- Talking about hopelessness or feeling trapped
- Severe or overwhelming emotional pain or distress
- sleeping too little or too much
- anger or hostility that seem out of character or out of context
- Increased substance use
- Talking about or posting about wanting to die
- Giving away prized possessions or items of value to them
- Looking for a way to access lethal means
- Making plans for suicide

If you have immediate concern, call your local mental health crisis provider, take your child to the nearest emergency department or call 911.

If you're struggling, it's okay to share your feelings. To start, you could copy one of these pre-written messages and send it to a trusted contact.

Reach out

"When you get a chance can you contact me? I feel really alone and suicidal, and could use some support."

Contact a loved one

"I don't want to die, but I don't know how to live. Talking with you may help me feel safe. Are you free to talk?"

Express your feelings

"This is really hard for me to say but I'm having painful thoughts and it might help to talk. Are you free?"

Check in

"I'm struggling right now and just need to talk to someone — can we chat?"

You're not alone!

If you don't have someone you feel like you can contact about your mental health, that doesn't mean you're alone. Remember that counselors are available 24/7 at the **988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline.**
